Watch Out for Hurricanes!

Meteorologists recently warned that chances of hurricane activity in Florida increased with the fading of El Nino – so it's more important than ever to refresh your supplies, go over your familiy's hurricane plan and review the "Official Palm Beach County Hurricane Planning Guide" at <u>www.readypbc.com</u>, and the Red Cross booklet written for seniors by seniors at <u>www.redcross.org/get-help/how-to-prepare-for-emergencies/seniors.html</u>

- □ Sufficient water and non-perishable food.
- **D** Fresh batteries, cash, medicine.
- □ Insurance and emergency contact information.



Meanwhile, in response to the deaths of 8 nursing home residents after a power failure during Hurriane Irma in 2017, Florida regulators issued emergency rules requiring nursing homes and assisted living facilities to maintain backup generators and fuel in case of a power failure. The Florida Agency for Health Care Administration and the Florida Department of Elder Affairs announced that facilities failing to implement an

emergency power plan would have to pay sanctions of up to \$1,000 a day, along with facing revocation of their license to operate in Florida. Nevertheless, it isn't

clear that all nursing homes and assisted living facilities have the required equipment. If you have loved ones in a Florida nursing facility, take time to contact the administrator to ask if back-up generators and fuel are in place.

Remember . . . 9/11

Traditionally, a moment of silence is observed at 8:46 a.m. on September 11, to recognize the first 9/11 attack in 2001. Besides resulting in about 3,000 immediate deaths, as well as injuries and toxic exposures for thousands more, 9/11 led to events that have changed the course of life throughout the United States and the world. An era of continuing wars started, along with increased surveillance, expanded intelligence-gathering, and stricter security checks at airports and ports of entry. Immigration became an ongoing focus of attention and U.S. deportations more than doubled. This is the 18th anniversary of 9/11, so

young persons aren't likely to have any personal memories of 9/11, or a time when America was not at war, or a commercial airline flight that didn't include full-body scans and shoe removal for most passengers. And that's all the more reason to observe a moment of silence . . . and remember 9/11.

Don't Be a Victim

Palm Beach County Sheriff's Department makes car theft prevention and the arrest of thieves an ongoing priority. Arrests are up, and South Florida saw a slight decline in car thefts last year but South Florida still experienced the most thefts in the state, a total of more than 20,000 in 2018, or an average of 55 for every day of the year.

Be theft smart. The tips below won't prevent all car thefts, but they'll make them less likely.

• Keep your vehicle locked at all times, even while driving.

- When parked, never leave your keys in the **car**.
- Never leave your car running and unattended.
- Avoid leaving valuables inside your **vehicle** where passersby can see them.
