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Recycling means revenue for Palm Beach County cities

Our nation celebrated America Recycles Day November 15! And when Palm Beach County residents Recycle Right, their city celebrates all year long.

Every year, the Solid Waste Authority of Palm Beach County<http://www.swa.org/> shares recycling revenues with the cities it serves. In Fiscal Year 2019 (Oct. 1, 2018 to Sept. 30, 2019), more than \$100,000 was shared with municipalities from Tequesta to Boca Raton. Since the SWA started the Municipal Revenue Share Program in 2010, local municipalities have shared almost \$9.7 million.

The Municipal Revenue Share Program rewards the SWA's municipal partners for the role they play in making Palm Beach County's dual stream recycling program successful. Each city's recyclables are transported to the SWA, and once the SWA has sorted, baled and sold those commodities, the revenue is shared back with the cities, after processing costs.

In the last fiscal year, county residents placed more than 90,000 tons of recyclables in their blue and yellow recycle bins. That's more than 180 million pounds of recyclable waste that would have otherwise been trashed.

Ultimately, more than 73,500 tons of recyclables were sold to mills and factories that could use them in making materials for new products. The top recycled items were:

- · Mixed paper more than 22,300 tons
- Glass more than 19,200 tons
- · Cardboard more than 16,700 tons
- · Newspaper more than 6,700 tons
- · Plastic more than 6,200 tons
- · Steel more than 1,300 tons
- · Aluminum more than 800 tons
- · Cartons more than 51 tons

The revenue received from marketing these recyclables varies due to market conditions and international policy. Since 2018, China's National Sword policy has had the biggest impact on the reduction in recycling revenues.

Each municipality spends their portion of the Municipal Revenue Share as they see fit.

The net Municipal Revenue Share for each municipality consists of the total recovered residential materials revenue received by the SWA for each quarter less the processing cost for that quarter. That amount is divided by the total tons received to determine an average price per ton and multiplied by the adopted annual Municipal Revenue Share percentage (50% in FY 19) to set the program price for the quarter. The revenue received from recovered materials varies depending on market prices and availability.

Self-haul municipalities receive their Revenue Share based on the actual weight of acceptable loads delivered to an approved SWA facility. The other municipalities, who share a common hauler, share the balance of those revenues in proportion with their total equivalent residential unit (ERU), which is calculated with single family and mobile homes as 1 ERU each and multifamily homes as 0.75 ERU per unit.

In addition, more than 4M pounds of home chemicals were collected to be safely disposed of or recycled. The most dropped off home chemicals were:

- Latex paint more than 2,156,000 pounds
- · Electronics more than 864,000 pounds

- · Used motor oil more than 451,000 pounds
- · Cylinders/propane tanks more than 179,000 pounds
- · Corrosives more than 68,000 pounds
- · Batteries (lead acid) more than 63,000 pounds
- · Pesticides and poisons more than 45,000 pounds

Though this effort is not a part of the traditional Municipal Revenue Share program, it does demonstrate that our county's residents do take an active role to dispose of items the right way.

- Produce enough electricity to power approximately 74,000 homes
- Recycle more than 150,000 tons of wastewater treatment residuals<http://swa.org/353/Biosolids-Processing-Facility> (sludge from flushes) into environmentally-friendly fertilizer
- · Safely dispose of more than 3.9 million pounds of home hazardshttp://swa.org/171/Home-Chemical-Disposal> a year
- Collect water off of the roofs of Renewable Energy Facility 2<<u>http://swa.org/375/Palm-Beach-Renewable-Energy-Facility-2</u>> and store it in a 2 million gallon cistern, which is used as part of the energy making process
