

South Palm Beach County COVID-19 Testing Site Opening at South County Civic Center

A Palm Beach County COVID-19 drive thru testing site in collaboration with the Board of County Commissioners, Cleveland Clinic Florida, the Florida National Guard, and the Florida Division of Emergency Management will open on Tuesday April 7 at 8:00 A.M. The testing site is located at the South County Civic Center, 16700 Jog Road, Delray Beach, FL 33446. The Cleveland Clinic Florida will be scheduling appointments and handling testing and Palm Beach County, with the assistance of the National Guard, will handle the operation and logistics of the site. Testing kits will be obtained through the Florida Division of Emergency Management.

Telephone registration and appointment scheduling will begin on Monday, April 6, 2020 at 10:00 A.M. Beginning Tuesday, April 7, the phone line will be open 7: 00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M., seven days a week. Following Tuesday's opening, testing will be available Monday through Friday from 8 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. and Saturday from 8 A.M. to 12 P.M. Preapproval and appointments are required. Individuals requesting testing will be approved through telephone screening conducted by Cleveland Clinic Florida. Screening criteria will include presence of symptoms, exposures, and risk factors.

A brief telephone interview will be conducted to determine eligibility for COVID-19 testing. There may be a high volume of calls, but staff will get to them as quickly as possible. Callers approved for testing will be given an appointment date and time slot for arrival at the testing site. Appointments can be made at 561-804-0250. Upon arrival at the site, a rapid check-in procedure will be conducted that will include verification of appointment time.

Individuals without appointments will be turned away and directed to call Cleveland Clinic of Florida to schedule an appointment. The check-in procedures and the testing (swab sample collection) will be conducted through an open window of the vehicle. No one will be permitted to leave their vehicles.

Testing results will be reported to Cleveland Clinic Florida who will notify the patient and the Palm Beach County Health Department. Results can be expected in up to five days, however, it may take longer. Individuals testing positive will be advised of isolation and quarantine protocols and referred for medical care if necessary.

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Tallahassee, Fla. – Today, the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) announced a new, mobile-friendly online application for Reemployment Assistance available at www.FloridaJobs.org/RAApplication.

Floridians who do not have a current open Reemployment Assistance claim should complete their application online at www.FloridaJobs.org/RAApplication.

To utilize the user-friendly online Reemployment Assistance application or to download the paper Reemployment Assistance application, Floridians should visit www.FloridaJobs.org/COVID-19. If a Floridian chooses to submit a paper application for Reemployment Assistance benefits, they should mail their application to DEO, and a representative will call when their application is processed.

Any Floridian who has lost their job due to COVID-19, is encouraged to complete a Reemployment Assistance application. The following are the steps needed to complete an application online or by mail.

Step 1 – Collect all information needed to complete the Reemployment Application.

You will need the following information to submit an application for Reemployment Assistance benefits. You are encouraged to collect the following documents and information before beginning the application process.

- Social Security number
- Driver's License or State ID number
- Employment information for the last 18 months for each employer:
- Employer ID FEIN number (this is found on your W2 or 1099 tax form), if available
- Employer name (name on pay stub), address, and phone number
- First and last day of work
- Gross earnings (before taxes are taken out) covering the last 18 months
- Reason for separation

If you are one of the following, make sure you have this additional information available:

- Not a U.S. Citizen: Alien Registration Number or other work authorization form
- Military employee: Copy of your DD-214 Member 4; If you do not have the Member 4, then a copy of your Member 2-7 may be used.
- Federal employee: SF-8 or SF-50
- Union member: Union name, hall number, and phone number

Step 2 – Submit your Reemployment Assistance application.

You can apply online at www.FloridaJobs.org/RAApplication or print an application for Reemployment Assistance at www.FloridaJobs.org/COVID-19. Paper applications may take longer to process than completing an online application.

CareerSource locations across the state are available to assist with completing and submitting your online application. They are also available to provide paper applications. Visit CareerSourceFlorida.com for center locations.

FedEx is also offering Floridians the option to print and mail applications for Reemployment Assistance at locations throughout the state free of charge.

Step 3 – Receive your Reemployment Assistance application confirmation.

If you mail your Reemployment Assistance application to DEO, a representative will contact you after your application is processed.

A written determination will be provided electronically and/or by mail to explain if you are monetarily eligible, and if you are, what your weekly benefit amount will be.



FDACS & Commissioner Nikki Fried Create List Connecting Farmers & Buyers

Tallahassee, Fla. – Today, Agriculture Commissioner Nicole "Nikki" Fried and

the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services announced the creation of a Florida Farm to You commodities list, connecting potential buyers with farmers and producers of Florida-grown commodities like fresh produce, seafood, poultry, and more.

With restaurants and foodservice businesses closed due to COVID-19, agricultural producers across the country have struggled to sell perishable products like fruits and vegetables. The Florida Farm to You commodities list is updated daily with Florida-grown products including tomatoes, watermelons, lettuce, blueberries, oysters, chicken, tilapia, and more.

By emailing FLFarmToYou@FDACS.gov, Florida farmers can have their available products listed. Buyers, food banks, and consumers can directly connect with growers selling these products using contact information on the list. Commissioner Fried has also spoken with large retailers including Publix, Walmart, and Whole Foods, as well as state agencies and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, requesting that they purchase or stock more Florida-grown commodities. Sprouts Farmers Markets recently indicated they would increase efforts to stock more Fresh From Florida and Florida-grown products.

"We have worked tirelessly to support Florida's farmers during COVID-19 by connecting them with buyers and consumers, and our Florida Farm To You commodities list is the latest way we're doing so," said **Commissioner Nikki Fried**. "There's no silver bullet to solving the decreased demand from foodservice businesses, but by connecting our agricultural producers with willing takers, we can help move Florida-grown products from fields to consumers."

KEEP FLORIDA GROWING: VIDEO HOW-1

Keep your message simple, see the 3 parts we've broken it down into below. There are some examples of what you might say, but we want you to use your own words - it's more impactful that way. The one specific line we would like you to end the video with is "Together, we can keep Florida growing." Just remember, keep it simple and short. Videos should no be longer than 45 seconds.

1: INTRODUCTION

Introduce yourself and your farm. Ex: 'Hi, I'm Jack from General Farms in Immokalee. We're a 4th generation family farm and a small business that employs people in our community. We grow a variety of produce, mainly tomatoes, peppers, and cucumbers."

2: CURRENT SITUATION

Explain issues caused by COVID-19. Ex: "Usually, we sell our produce to highvolume buyers, like restaurants and food processing facilities - but the coronavirus has lowered demand for those purchases, causing our crops to sit unsold."

3: CALL TO ACTION

Tell viewers to buy Floridagrown. Ex: "We need consumers to buy Floridagrown produce. Look for Florida products at your grocery store or market, if you don't see any, ask an employee. We're working to feed our state, and the country, but we need your support - together, we can keep Florida growing."

LANDSCAPE: Hold phone horizontally.

VIDEO TIPS: IN FOCUS: Get subject in the shot, tap on their face on screen to focus before recording.

GOOD LIGHTING: Avoid filming with a light source behind the subject-make sure the light source is facing the front of the subject.

GOOD ANGLE: Frame your subject in the center, leave some space above their head.

STEADY, NOT SHAKY: Use both hands, hold steady. If you have shaky hands, try resting your elbows on a hard surface if possible.

SPEAK UP: If you're on camera, speak loudly & clearly.

HIGH QUALITY: Go to Camera Settings on your phone. Many phones can film in 4K (high definition). Choose the highest-quality option possible (4K is highest, 720p is lowest.)

Use of Cloth Face Coverings to Help Slow the Spread of COVID-19

How to Wear Cloth Face Coverings

Cloth face coverings should-

- · fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face
- · be secured with ties or ear loops
- · include multiple layers of fabric
- · allow for breathing without restriction
- be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape

CDC on Homemade Cloth Face Coverings

CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies), especially in areas of significant community-based transmission.

CDC also advises the use of simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. Cloth face coverings fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials at low cost can be used as an additional, voluntary public health measure.

Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the cloth face covering without assistance.

The cloth face coverings recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators. Those are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for healthcare workers and other medical first responders, as recommended by current CDC guidance.

Should cloth face coverings be washed or otherwise cleaned regularly? How regularly?

Yes. They should be routinely washed depending on the frequency of use

How does one safely sterilize/clean a cloth face covering?

A washing machine should suffice in properly washing a cloth face covering.

How does one safely remove a used cloth face covering?

Individuals should be careful not to touch their eyes, nose, and mouth when removing their cloth face covering and wash hands immediately after removing.


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
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


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
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PBC Housing Programs Continue to Provide Assistance

The Department of Housing & Economic Sustainability (DHES) continues to offer assistance to Palm Beach County homeowners and prospective renters.

The Mortgage and Housing Investments staff offers assistance through the following programs:

- Foreclosure Prevention Funding may be provided to assist with delinquent mortgage payments, property taxes and homeowner insurance to prevent foreclosure. Applicants can apply for up to \$20,000.
- Rental Assistance Funding may be provided to assist with rental security deposits, utility deposits, connection fees, housing stability counseling and rent payments up to 12 months. The best way to apply for assistance is through the Department of Community Services electronic system via the link below or by calling (561) 904-7900. https://secure.co.palm-beach.fl.us/CSDServiceEligibility/Account/Login.aspx
- The Purchase Assistance Program assists pre-approved applicants with financial assistance to purchase their first home.
- The Rehabilitation/Repair Housing Assistance Program assists approved clients with rehabilitation or emergency repair to their owner-occupied homes.
- The Workforce Housing Program assists approved buyers purchase homes at one of the workforce housing sites.

We are currently in a Special Enrollment Period where consumers who experience qualifying events, such as a drastic change in income, loss of a job or loss of healthcare coverage can apply for health insurance through Healthcare.gov. Consumers have a 60 day window to enroll or modify their healthcare coverage either before their qualifying event or after their qualifying event and will have to submit documentation of life change to the marketplace prior to them being granted a special enrollment window. In many cases, proof of income and immigration is also necessary.

EARLY LEARNING COALITION OF PALM BEACH COUNTY OFFERS CHILD CARE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FIRST RESPONDERS AND EMERGENCY PERSONNEL FAMILIES

Child Care scholarships for those on the front-line of the COVID-19 response effort

PALM BEACH COUNTY, FL (April 2, 2020) —First responders, emergency personnel, and other essential workers in Palm Beach County with child care needs will soon get some relief.

The Early Learning Coalition of Palm Beach County is offering a limited number of child care scholarships for those serving on the front-line of the COVID-19 response effort. Many of these hard-working families and single parents are having a difficult time finding child care because their current provider may have temporarily closed. The Early Learning Coalition is poised to help. Not only can the Coalition quickly connect parents to high-quality child care, but the Coalition now has the ability to provide a scholarship for child care for up to 60 days for these critical employees. All first responders, emergency personnel, and critical response workers can apply. There is no income eligibility requirements for this program.

This program would not be possible without the steadfast support of Dr. Lisa Williams-Taylor, and the entire Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County organization, along with a generous donation from a private foundation in Palm Beach County.

"Now that the school district is closed until further notice, our first responders and emergency personnel need safe and consistent high-quality child care for their young children and elementary-aged children," said Warren Eldridge, CEO of the Early Learning Coalition of Palm Beach County. "The last thing they need to worry about right now is finding and paying for child care for their children...it's the least we could do to help."


