I wanted to provide a quick update on all things happening up in Tallahassee which is having a direct effect on the people of District 29, as well as some important local news. The Governor has signed over 200 bills completing the legislative session, including my first signed laws as your State Senator: CS/CS/CS/SB 1946: Anchoring Limitation Areas, and CS/SB 1256: Homestead Exemption for Seniors 65 and Older. These two bills that were signed by the Governor on June 29 will have a direct, positive impact on our district, and I am proud to have worked to get them passed. I also wanted to share some information on the upcoming Freedom Week Tax holiday, updated information on COVID-19 vaccine/testing locations, summer food programs, important bills that go into effect on July 1, and more!

2021 FREEDOM TAX HOLIDAY

Independence Day is just around the corner, and this year the Florida Legislature passed a new tax holiday to help you stock up on summer supplies tax-free. Florida's Freedom Week Tax-Free Holiday starts this Thursday, July 1, and runs through Wednesday, July 7. You can save on items like concert, museum and movie tickets, passes to Florida state parks, outdoor, beach and fishing gear, and more.

BOATING AND WATER ACTIVITIES

The first \$75 on the price of life jackets and coolers; The first \$50 on the price of safety flares; The first \$150 on the price of weter

The first \$150 on the price of water skis, wakeboards, kneeboards, and recreational inflatable water tubes; The first \$300 on the price of paddleboards and surfboards;

The first \$500 on the price of canoes and kayaks;

The first \$75 on the price of paddles and oars; and

The first \$25 on the price of snorkels, goggles, and swimming masks.

OTHER RECREATIONAL SAVINGS

Up to the first \$15 on the price of sunscreen or insect repellant; The first \$100 on a pair of sunglasses; The first \$200 on a pair of binoculars; The first \$30 on the price of water bottles; The first \$50 on the price of hydration packs; The first \$250 of the sales price of outdoor gas or charcoal grills; The first \$50 of the sales price of bicycle helmets; and The first \$250 of the sales price of bicycles. Floridians can also save on equipment used for individual or team sports. This does not include clothing or footwear selling for \$40 or less.

CAMPING SUPPLIES

The first \$200 on the price of purchase of tents; The first \$50 on the price of sleeping bags, portable hammocks, camping stoves, and collapsible camping chairs: and The first \$30 on the price of camping lanterns and flashlights. Florida shoppers more interested in fishing can find savings on: The first \$75 on the price of individual rods and reels; or The first \$150 on the price of a set of rods and reels; The first \$30 on the price of tackle boxes or bags; and The first \$5 on the price of individual bait or fishing tackle; or The first \$10 on the price of multiple bait and tackle items sold together.

OTHER ITEMS THAT ARE TAX-FREE

Live music events; Live sporting events; Movies at the movie theater; Entry to a museum, including any annual passes; Entry to a state park, including any annual passes; Entry to a ballet, play, or musical theatre performance; Season tickets for ballets, plays, music events, or musical theatre performances; Entry to a fair, festival, or cultural event; or Access or use of private and/or membership clubs providing physical fitness facilities.

Over 100 new laws passed in the 2021 legislative session go into effect July 1. These laws vary in importance and impact, but I wanted to include a number of them in the Pulse that will have the most direct impact on the people of District 29.

ANNUAL BUDGET

The new state budget will include much needed money for 7061, which included new sales-Everglades restoration, funds to combat sea-level rising, and increase the minimum pay of state workers to \$13 an hour, while giving bonuses to COVID-19 first responders, and additional monies to raise teacher salaries.

ONLINE SALES TAX

Newly signed SB 50 will require sales tax on out-of-state online purchases.

BALLOT INITIATIVES

SB 1890 includes a \$3,000 limit on contributions to political organizations trying to get constitutional amendments on Florida ballots. This new law is also being challenged in federal

court.

DRINKS TO GO

SB 148 allows restaurants to continue to sell alcoholic beverages in pickup or delivery meals after the pandemic.

TAX BREAKS

The legislature approved SB tax holidays including back-toschool and Freedom Week, which starts on July 1.

SOCIAL MEDIA

SB 7072, the now infamous social media bill, creates a penalty system for social media companies for removing political candidates from their platforms. This bill is already being challenged in federal court.

PROPERTY INSURANCE

SB 76 looks to reduce overall homeowner insurance rates. It limits attorney fees in a lawsuit, cuts the time to file a lawsuit from 3 to 2 years, and prevents contractors from soliciting homeowners for roof repairs.

TRANS ATHLETES

One of the most controversial bills this session, SB 1028 bans transgender girls from playing on girls high school and college sports teams.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

SB 2006 authorizes the Governor to circumvent local governments declaring a state of emergency. BANS THE USE **OF VACCINE "PASSPORTS"** BY BUSINESSES, **GOVERMENTS, AND** SCHOOLS.

COVID-19 VACCINE/TESTING

As the COVID-19 pandemic situation begins to improve, this is a friendly reminder to GET VACCINATED. The Delta variant that is spreading across Florida is even more infectious than before. It is crucial for you, your family, and community that we vaccinate as many people as possible to protect EVERYONE.

Many people are beginning to travel both domestically and internationally again, which MAY require negative COVID-19 test results EVEN WITH PROOF OF VACCINATION.

STUDENT SUMMER FOOD PROGAMS



Broward County Public Schools Food and Nutrition Services is offering FREE Grab-and-Go Summer Meals to ensure children have access to nutritious meals.

Starting on June 15, 2021 meals will be distributed to all children in the community 18 years of age and younger on TUESDAYS through curbside distribution.

Meal distribution times vary by school location during the school day. Visit www.browardschools.com/food-service or call 211 for individual service times.

Children or their parents can pick up multiple meals at a time by walking or driving through the car or bus loop. Parents must have identification for their child to pick up meals if the child is not present. Recommended forms of identification include student ID, report card, or birth certificate. Identification must be present at each meal service.

SURFSIDE TRAGEDY

On June 24, 2021, tragedy struck a small beach town near Miami as a 12-story beachfront condominium had a partial collapse. At the time of this newsletter, the death toll is up to 16, with 147 people still unaccounted for.

There are a number of organizations that are accepting much needed supplies to support those who have been effected by this horrific incident.

The Palm Beach County Medical Society is collecting much needed donations for those affected by the building collapse in Surfside.
