No increase in property tax rate

For the 11th straight year, the Board of County Commissioners voted to maintain the current tax rate at the 4.78 millage rate which is the tax rate per \$1,000 of your real property's "taxable" value. Due to the increase in property values, this will generate a 5.6% increase in tax revenue generating a total of \$1.1 billion. Notwithstanding the recent surge in property values, the taxable value of residential real estate protected by homestead will only increase by a maximum of 1.4%.

Property taxes represents 63% of the county's general fund revenue source. Other sources include excess fund assets over liabilities (17%), intergovernmental revenues such as grants (13%), licenses, permits and fees (3%) and charges for services (3%).

The budget process presented us with a number of challenges as a result of the pandemic which caused a \$74 million decrease in revenues compared to prepandemic fiscal year 2019. The areas most negatively impacted was revenue generated by gas taxes, half-cent sales tax, and parks and recreation fees.

The Board was able to offset these losses with \$46.4 million from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for eligible expenses (such as capital improvement projects). This was a small portion of the \$291 million in ARPA funds the county received.

In the next few months, the Board will discuss ARPA funding priorities which need to be set by 2024 and spent by 2026 with a focus on impactful, long-term projects concerning infrastructure, cybersecurity/broadband, housing, hunger relief and more.

We anticipate a gradual return of county revenues to prepandemic levels over the next five years.

More job openings than unemployed

The county's unemployment rate was reported at just 4.7% for August, well below national and state averages. There are more job openings than unemployed for the second consecutive month – 37,267 job openings vs. 35,320 unemployed people according to CareerSource Palm Beach County that offers services for both business and job seekers. Some of its services include career counseling, business coaching, training programs, and employment assistance.

Lien Amnesty Program

A Code Enforcement Lien Amnesty Program was recently approved by the Board for residential and nonresidential property owners located in unincorporated Palm Beach County.

This is a terrific program providing property and lien holders with an opportunity to have their entire outstanding lien balance forgiven.

In addition to other requirements, the subject property must be in full compliance with all county codes to have the outstanding lien balance forgiven. The deadline to apply is November 30, 2021 and must include a nonrefundable \$250 application fee.
