State Representative Emily Slosberg-King Announces She Will Not Seek Re-election In 2022

BOCA RATON, FL – Florida State Representative Emily Slosberg-King announced today that she will not seek re-election in 2022.

Emily Slosberg-King was first elected to the Florida House to represent House District 91 in 2016 and was subsequently re-elected in 2018 and 2020.

"My call to public service began after my twin sister, Dori, was tragically killed in a car accident. Since then, I've led the charge on laws that save lives and policies to better our state," said Rep. Emily Slosberg-King. "I'm proud of the accomplishments we've achieved and the challenges we've overcome to improve the lives of my constituents and our communities. It's time to pass the baton, so I can focus on my family, professional obligations, and personal goals."

Emily and her family created the Dori Slosberg Foundation in honor of her twin sister and they have been advocating for stronger traffic safety laws for over 20 years. Emily's father, The Honorable Irv Slosberg, also served multiple terms in the Florida Legislature.

Representative Slosberg-King currently serves as Democratic Ranking Member of the Pandemics & Public Emergencies Committee and the Tourism, Infrastructure & Energy Committee in the Florida House. She is also a member of the Redistricting Committee, Rules Committee, Ways & Means Committee, and Infrastructure & Tourism Appropriations Committee.

Representative Slosberg-King was recognized for her leadership in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma by the Alliance of Delray Residential Neighborhood Associations, as well as for her efforts on behalf of the Jewish community by Ruth and Norman Rales Jewish Family Services. Slosberg-King was named "Freshman Legislator of the Year" in 2016 and "Elected Official Champion" by the Florida Dental Association and the Florida Bicycle Association, respectively.

Representative Emily Slosberg-King was born and raised in South Florida. She graduated from Florida Atlantic University with a major in Criminal Justice and received her Juris Doctor from Nova Southeastern University's Shepard Broad College of Law. Emily and her husband, Steven, are excited to welcome their daughter in June 2022.
