Mayor No More Gregg hands off gavel to Maria Sachs



After presiding over the board for one year, Mayor Gregg Weiss handed off the gavel to Maria Sachs, who was chosen by her colleagues to serve as Palm Beach County Mayor. Commissioner Maria Marino was selected as Vice Mayor, and she will be serving as the chair of the Solid Waste Authority governing board. Gregg, first elected in 2018, was chosen to serve as mayor following his reelection in November 2022. He will serve out the remainder of his final 4-year term.

"All in all, I look back on a successful year. Despite our different perspectives, I think the board worked together collaboratively to conduct the people's business. Personally, I feel privileged to have worked on bringing together stakeholders to expand Mental Health Court, which I will continue to do. I'm also excited to continue working on frameworks for the safe and responsible application of Artificial Intelligence, both locally and through the National Association of Counties. It's been a true honor to serve the people of Palm Beach County in the capacity of Mayor for a year. I wish Mayor Maria Sachs all the best for the year ahead."

Gregg gave a brief speech, thanking his fellow board members and county staff. He then proceeded to give parting presents to express gratitude to his colleagues. Because every house deserves a cat, animal care and control staff brought out cat carriers for each of the commissioners, who were surprised but delighted to find out that they all received not one but, because cats need friends, two plush kittens in addition to a photo portrait and a book.

Recycling cooking oil and other tips

WHY COLLECT USED COOKING OIL?

FATS, OILS and GREASE - these are commonly referred to as F.O.G.

F.O.G., which includes used cooking oils, can be a serious problem for home plumbing and Palm Beach County's wastewater collection system. Cooking oil that's poured down the sink - even if followed with hot water or soap; or flushed down the toilet; or put down the garbage disposal doesn't disappear. It can gel and solidify into thick layers inside drainpipes, sewage pipelines, and sewage lift stations, constricting water flow and possibly backing up home plumbing. It's messy, smelly and costly to clean up. If you have used residential cooking oil and grease, we want it.

PUT GREASE WHERE IT BELONGS

To recycle cooking oil properly here's what you can do:

Allow the used cooking oil to cool.

- Carefully pour the used, cooled cooking oil into a large, sturdy plastic or wax-coated leak proof container, such as the original container or a juice carton, no larger than 5-gallons in size.
- Cap the container so it is secure.
- Store the container in a cool, safe location until it is full.
- Don't mix the grease with any other liquids or products.
- Once the container is full, bring it to a Solid Waste Authority of Palm Beach County Home Chemical and Recycling drop off location.

WHERE CAN I TAKE COOKING OIL?

Palm Beach County residents can bring their used residential cooking oil to any of the Solid Waste Authority's **Home Chemical and Recycling Centers**.

OTHER USEFUL TIPS TO BE A GREASE BUSTER

- Pour leftover grease and cooking oil into a separate container. Cool and dispose of as noted above.
- Before washing pots, pans and dishes, scrape leftover food into the trash can or use paper towels to clean out the residue.
- Clean out grease and leftover foods from the sink, and put into the trash.
- Teach your children to follow your grease-fighting example.

PBI Travel Tips to Ensure a Smooth Experience



Palm Beach International Airport (PBI) recommends travelers follow easy tips for a stress-free journey through the airport this holiday season. The airport will be busier than usual with record passenger volumes occurring since late spring.

Tips for an Easy Holiday Trip:

- **Check** with your airline on your flight's status before coming to the airport.
- If you are picking someone up, be sure to wait in the Cell Phone Waiting lot, located off Belvedere Road behind Drive Shack. Vehicles may not wait at the passenger pick up area near the terminal.
- Allow extra time to find parking and be aware parking areas closest to the terminal often reach capacityaround the holidays.
- Lock your vehicle when leaving it at the airport and never leave the keys with the vehicle.
- Never bring prohibited items including weapons of any kind to the airport. Mace and pocket knivesare among prohibited items.
- Always have your boarding pass and ID ready when going through TSA screening.
- Anticipate longer than typical screening times around the holiday season.
- Check with your airline to ensure your carry-on bag will fit in the overhead compartment.
- Label all luggage with your name and contact information.
- Liquids and gels in carry-on bags must be 3.4 oz. or less and fit in a one quart clear zip seal bag. Each passenger is only permitted one zip seal bag.
- If you lose an item at the airport, follow the instructions at: http://www.pbia.org.

- Remember: ride sharing services such as Uber and Lyft are available on level three while taxis and busservice are available on level one.
- Monitor PBI's social media accounts for significant announcements.

ALZHEIMER'S COMMUNITY CARE

In Florida approximately 580,000 people aged 65 and older are living with Alzheimer's disease. Cases are projected to increase by 24% to 720,000 by 2025, with 70% of the care provided by family caregivers in the community.

In Palm Beach County approximately 47,880 currently have probable Alzheimer's disease.

It is critical that Alzheimer's families coping with the disease are safe, with wellbeing, dignity, and quality of life preserved, through services and resources accessible to all.



A DISCUSSION ON ANTISEMITISM
