Department FY2023 Highlights and Accomplishments:

- 1. Overall contribution to economic impact through Sports Tourism \$10.2M, along with 14,512 room nights and 17 events.
- 2. The Aquatics Division successfully taught swim lessons to 979 participants in partnership with the Drowning Prevention Coalition and Red Cross. Additionally, 46 students received their free lifeguard certification through and innovative pilot program funded by the Children Services Council of Palm Beach County.
- 3. Adapted to increased demand for our facilities through innovation and resourcefulness. Added 38 pickleball courts in the last three years by mostly repurposing older rinks and courts. Harnessed partnerships and secured grants as evidenced by Soccer 5 concession and Orange Bowl field / neighborhood center.

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Department FY2024 Emerging Issues:

- 1. Aging facilities and amenities, along with increased public demand, climate changes and emerging recreation and technology trends, continue to require significant capital improvements and the identification of both short-range and long-range infrastructure funding strategies.
- 2. Financial and human resources continue to be strained by rising inflationary costs, process constraints and supply chain issues for goods and services and staff recruitment challenges for entry-level and skill specific positions. These issues are impacting service delivery, the ability to achieve key performance metrics, and delaying construction projects.
- 3. An increased lack of civility, dispute escalation, and park ordinance violations in our public spaces has emphasized our collaborative working relationship with law enforcement, the increased need to procure off-duty resources, further implementation of crime prevention through environmental design and crowd safety measures, and additional training for staff in safety related topics, mental health resources, and de-escalation techniques.


PBC Parks & Recreation Focus Areas for FY24


- Sustain quality core service delivery
- Address Infrastructure w/ short-range and long-range strategies
 - Implementation of CIP to address failing infrastructure with an emphasis on safety park bridges, ocean pier, failing roofs and seawall
 - Complete/Initiate park construction in process
 - Phase 2 of Canyon District Park; Gramercy Park Neighborhood Center; Lake Lytal Aquatics Center replacement; Aquacrest Pool renovations, etc...
 - Complete/initiate park design and permitting to meet Level of Service and proximity goals (Cam D. Milani Beach Park; Windsor Park, Peanut Island Historic Area, etc...)
 - Continue to develop long-range infrastructure funding strategy
- Safety and security Continue implementing CPTED strategies, staff training, and explore outdoor AED station feasibility
- Better respond to heat impacts
 - New shade structures playgrounds, tree canopy, and lighting for nighttime play
- Provide for a greater sense of belonging and community connection
 - Communication boards at all 103 playgrounds (starting with 14, two in each of the seven commission districts) and Complete ADA Accessibility Audit for Department
- CAPRA Accreditation best practices and meaningful measurements
- Long range Dept. master plan and comprehensive plan updates through 2045

- Destination parks -
 - Morikami Park
 - Lake Biwa Pavilion Renovation (nearing completion)
 - Lake Biwa septic to sewer conversion (design completed; awaiting bid later this spring)
 - Parking lot lighting replacement (project advertised for bid)
 - Garden bridges renovation & replacement (reaching the end of their expected life; design being kicked off)
 - Museum Master Plan elements:
 - Ryokan (Japanese Gardens inspired Inn) partnership with operator/RFP summer
 - Amanohashidade (land peninsula/bridge)
 - Artisan Village / Bonsai expansion
 - Green Cay Nature Center and Wetlands
 - Phase II Development (partnership with Water Utilities Department)
 - Phase II Ground Breaking March 7, 2024 @ 9:00am
 - Connecting to Phase I of Green Cay nature trails, lakes and habitat, nature playground

- Lake Ida Park
 - Partnership with public rowing club @ old Jaycee's building
- Canyon District Park
 - Phase I complete; Phase 2 under design begin construction this year; baseball/softball; pavilion; playground, sand volleyball
 - Interlocal Agreement with School Board drafted;
 shared facilities with Middle School
- Cam D. Milani Beach Park
 - Site plan approved in 2009; design underway
 - Yamato rock connection to the Morikami Museum
- Windsor Park
 - Design underway (new pickleball and dog park)



- Burt Aaronson South County Regional Park
 - Boat ramp replacement (design nearing completion)
 - Pickleball court construction (complete)
 - Pickleball court lighting (electric design underway; complete later this year)
 - Baseball press box roof replacement and HVAC replacement (out for bid)
 - Bike/Pedestrian bridge connection to Arthur R. Marshall Loxahatchee Wildlife Refuge (seeking grants to fully fund)
 - Pavilion renovation (project out to bid soon)
 - Coconut Cove pool deck and shower renovations (awaiting BCC approval)
 - Coconut Cove Waterpark repairs (kick off meeting in next two months)
 - Sunset Cove HVAC backstage project (awaiting update from FDO on timeline)
 - Osprey Point Golf Learning Center Design Improvements and Construction (awaiting revised proposal from consultant)
 - West Boca Rotary Club project working on Peace Pole installation near nature center
- Veterans Park
 - LED Lighting for Tennis and Basketball Courts project recently complete
 - Evaluating tennis usage to consider pickleball conversion (currently no funding FY25 request)
- Loggers Run Park
 - Clean up of former concession debris complete; repair and repainting of cover in progress
 - Community survey indicated need for futsal/short sided soccer


Funding projects:
