

COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS

Southeast Florida Regional Climate Change Compact Completes Priority Climate Action Plan

On March 1, 2024, the Southeast Florida **Regional Climate Change Compact** submitted the Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP) to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Funded by the EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG) program, the PCAP is a greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction plan for the four-county Southeast Florida region (Palm Beach, Broward, Miami-Dade, and Monroe counties), its municipalities, and the Miccosukee and Seminole Tribal Government jurisdictions. The PCAP outlines the sectors that contribute the most to GHG emissions and potential measures to reduce these emissions. The EPA requires a PCAP for eligible entities to apply for up to \$500 million of the \$4.6 billion in EPA CPRG implementation funding to implement GHG reduction measures that the PCAP identifies. OOR Kicks off Community Workshops to Share Findings from the Initial Climate Risk Assessment

Palm Beach County (PBC) has been actively working with a team of consultants on a Climate Risk Assessment and Resilience Action Plan, which evaluates the impact of climate threats on unincorporated PBC and the western PBC communities. In July and August of 2023, the team held workshops to inform residents about the purpose of the Climate Risk Assessment and gain insight about which climate impacts the residents are already experiencing. In February and March of 2024, the team held workshops to share the Climate Risk Assessment's preliminary findings. Through engaging discussions and interactive polls, the community residents have demonstrated their awareness of climate change impacts and support for proactive community planning.

Join the South Florida City Nature Challenge!



This Earth Month, we would like to showcase a very exciting event occurring here in South Florida. Annually, the California Academy of Sciences and the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County hosts the City Nature Challenge, an international competition between cities to document the most wildlife observations. The City Nature Challenge is a four-day global "BioBlitz" to record as many organisms as possible within this time frame. The challenge is two-fold—the first part runs from April 26–April 29, 2024, when participants will document as many plants, animals, and other living things as they can. During the second part, running from April 30–May 5, 2024, participants will identify what they found. Winning cities will be announced on May 6, 2024.

Participating is simple! To contribute here in Southeast Florida:

- 1. Visit iNaturalist to join the South Florida City Nature Challenge project (#CNCsoflo). iNaturalist is a citizen-science app where users can upload nature observations and receive assistance in identifying what they saw from scientists, experts, and other nature lovers.
- 2. Capture a photograph of any wild plant, animal, fungi, or life form in Palm Beach, Broward, Miami-Dade, or Monroe counties. (Please do not upload photographs of captive/cultivated plants and animals, e.g., your dog!)
- **3.** Find and take pictures of as many organisms as you can within the four-day interval.
- 4. Upload your observations onto iNaturalist. Record the location.

City Nature Challenge organizers will score the cities based on their total number of observations, species, and participants. Learn more about the natural world around you, spread the word, and help our region get to the top! Go #CNCsoflo!



Governor Ron DeSantis Highlights Florida's Successful Efforts to Protect Florida's Manatees

On February 6, 2024, Governor DeSantis highlighted state efforts to protect Florida's manatees and improve water quality. Since 2019, the state has invested over \$50 million in manatee programs and \$1.8 billion in water quality improvements.
