## Palm Beach County Celebrates Earth Day

In celebration of Earth Day, several Palm Beach County (PBC) departments held events and activities throughout the county. Okeeheelee Nature Center and Daggerwing Nature Center hosted Earth Day celebrations with family-fun environmental activities, such as animal presentations, bird releases, guided nature hikes, and environmental education booths, which attracted over 2,200 attendees! PBC Libraries held Earth Day programs at multiple branches, including an upcycled garden buddies activity where participants made small animals out of recycled materials to place in a garden. The PBC Cooperative Extension Office hosted an Earth Day program at New Horizons Elementary School, where students assisted the staff in removing invasive plants on the campus and adding Florida-friendly plants to the landscape. Each student was also provided with their own air plant to take home. Furthermore, PBC Environmental Resources Management (ERM) staff organized

several trash clean-up events and participated in an Earth Day event at Ann Norton Sculpture Gardens. Last but certainly not least, the PBC Environmental Protection Cross-Departmental Team worked collaboratively to prepare an Earth Day Proclamation, proclaiming April 22, 2024, as Earth Day in PBC. # Office of Resilience (OOR) Takes on South Florida City Nature Challenge

On April 26, 2024, OOR participated in the <u>South Florida City Nature Challenge</u> by planning a staff BioBlitz at Apoxee Trail, located in <u>Grassy Waters Preserve</u>. The <u>City Nature Challenge</u> is an international competition between cities to document the most wildlife observations on <u>iNaturalist</u>, with organizers scoring cities based on their total number of observations, species, and participants. Staff observed a variety of organisms, including plants, animals, and fungi. Organizations across South Florida worked together to plan BioBlitz events during this challenge, including <u>PBC ERM's</u> BioBlitz of <u>High Ridge</u> <u>Scrub</u> and <u>Lantana Scrub</u> natural areas. South Florida ranked higher than ever in the number of observations and different species, putting us in the top four percent in every category and placing us at #7 in most species observed. Way to go, South Florida!



# Florida Nonprofit Coalition Awarded the Solar For All Grant for the State of Florida

A Florida nonprofit coalition composed of the <u>Solar and Energy Loan Fund (SELF)</u>, <u>Solar United Neighbors (SUN)</u>, and <u>The Nature Conservancy (TNC)</u> was recently awarded a \$156 million grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to expand solar energy in the state of Florida. Starting in October this year, the Solar For All grant will provide funds for grants and affordable financing for residential rooftop solar systems in low-income and disadvantaged communities throughout the state. Co-op volunteers choose an installer on behalf of the entire group through an open and competitive bidding process. ## It's Time to Prepare for Hurricane Season!



Are you ready for the 2024 hurricane season? The year's Atlantic hurricane season will officially begin on June 1, 2024. Prepare your home for the upcoming season to minimize the risk of flooding and storm damage. Take these steps to help you prepare for hurricane season:

- Review and prepare your emergency supply kit: Secure canned food, bottled or canned water, medications, tools, flashlights, batteries, cleaning supplies, important documents, and more. View PBC's Division of Emergency Management (DEM) emergency supply kit shopping list here.
- Know your hurricane evacuation zone and shelter location: Click <a href="here">here</a> to use PBC DEM's interactive mapping tool to check your hurricane evacuation zone and nearest shelter location.
- Know your flood zone: To best stay informed about flood risks in your area, it is
  helpful to know which flood zone you live in. Click <a href="here">here</a> to view the County's
  flood zone lookup tool.

- Download the PBC Disaster Awareness and Recovery Tool (PBC DART): The PBC DART app provides information on how to prepare for a hurricane and allows you to report damage to your home or business after a storm hits. - Write down emergency phone numbers: Make sure these numbers are written down and saved into your cell phone.
- Remove plant debris around your home and ensure that drainage ditches, swales, and gates are clear: Debris can create blockages, contributing to flooding during storm events.
- Clear your yard: Bring lawn furniture, grills, bikes, and other items inside your home before a storm.
- Put up shutters or plywood on your windows: If a hurricane is expected to hit, protect your windows from shattering by installing shutters or nailing plywood to the outside of your window frames.

<u>Biden-Harris Administration Announces Historic \$20 Billion in Awards</u>

On April 4, 2024, the Biden-Harris Administration announced selections for \$20 billion in awards to support a national financing network that will fund thousands of climate and clean energy projects throughout the country. <u>Biden-Harris Administration Finalizes First-Ever National Drinking</u>
Water Standard to Protect 100 Million People from PFAS Pollution

On April 10, 2024, the Biden-Harris Administration announced the first-ever national, legally enforceable drinking water standard to protect communities from exposure to polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). PFAS, or 'forever chemicals,' have been linked to human health issues, including cancers and immune and developmental damage to infants and children. State of Florida Announces \$1.5 Billion for Everglades Restoration and Water Quality Improvements in Fiscal Year 2024–25

On Earth Day, Governor Ron DeSantis announced that \$1.5 billion of the Fiscal Year 2024–25 budget will be allocated towards Everglades restoration and water quality improvements. Funding will support the <u>Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP)</u>, Everglades Agricultural Area Reservoir, the C-51 reservoir, which will reduce freshwater discharges to the Lake Worth Lagoon, and water quality improvement projects throughout the state. # State of Florida Highlights Investments in Strengthening and Fortifying Florida

On April 24, 2024, Governor Ron DeSantis signed new legislation to expand the My Safe Florida Home Program. This program helps Floridians protect their homes against tropical storms and hurricanes. In addition to the \$200 million that will be allocated to the program in the next Fiscal Year, the governor signed legislation to establish the My Safe Florida Condominium Pilot Program and committed to signing \$50 million to fund beach renourishment projects. 
