COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS



Office of Resilience (OOR) Staff Attend Southeast Sustainability Directors Network (SSDN) Annual Meeting

Palm Beach County (PBC) OOR staff were thrilled to attend SSDN's Annual Meeting held in Charlotte, North Carolina, from April 30–May 3, 2024. SSDN connects local government sustainability professionals throughout the southeast region to accelerate, scale, and implement sustainable best practices so that communities are equipped to adapt to and mitigate climate change. This conference was a great opportunity to learn about hot topics in sustainability and resilience from our counterparts in the southeast and to network with other local government staff working towards similar goals for their communities.



OOR Director Presents at the National Adaptation Forum

From May 14–16, 2024, OOR Director Megan Houston attended the National Adaptation Forum in Saint Paul, Minnesota. While there, she participated in a panel on conducting effective climate adaptation. She discussed how climate risk assessments can be used to set resiliency goals and support metrics that assess adaptation efficacy, such as dollars invested in resiliency improvements. She also highlighted how existing and future climate risk assessments will be incorporated into PBC's capital construction planning process, which requires County project planners to consider and disclose resiliency and sustainability principles and complete a resiliency and sustainability checklist.



Palm Beach County Water Utilities Department (PBC WUD) Awarded State Grant Funding For Water Reuse Projects

Great news! PBC WUD was awarded \$5.7 million in grant funding from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for two water reuse projects. PBC WUD was previously awarded \$2.7 million for the south Palm Beach County reclaimed water pipeline,

as well as \$3 million for the Green Cay Wetlands Surficial Aquifer System. The Green Cay Wetlands Surficial Aquifer System is a component of Green Cay Phase II, a project that seeks to expand the popular Green Cay Nature Center and Wetlands by creating a new park and Reclamation Education & Center for Advanced Purification. Staying Safe During Extreme Heat



As we experience unrelenting heat here in South Florida, it is important to understand the dangers of heat-related illnesses. In the past few weeks, heat indices, or "real feel" temperatures, from between 100 to 108 degrees Fahrenheit (F) have occurred throughout the County. Heat Advisories occur when the Heat Index is at or above 108F for at least two hours, and Excessive Heat Warnings occur when the Heat Index is at 113F or higher for at least two hours. Extreme heat can lead to both heat exhaustion and heat stroke illnesses. The County advises residents to practice heat safety during these hot and humid days. You can reduce your risk of heat-related illnesses by:

- Never leaving people and pets in a parked car—Temperatures in a parked car can
 rise quickly, which can cause illness or death, especially for children, vulnerable
 adults, and pets. If you see a person or pet in a parked vehicle on a hot day, call 91-1 immediately;
- **Limiting time outside**—avoid being outside during the midday heat and spend more time inside when possible;
- Using public spaces—take advantage of public spaces with air conditioning when
 possible. Use this time to read a book or surf the internet at one of the great library
 locations within the County (PBC Library Map HERE); visit a local splash pad, pool,
 community center, or neighborhood clubhouse. Plan your shopping for the middle
 of the day to stay cool when it is hottest out;
- Staying hydrated—drink plenty of water, even if you don't feel thirsty. Avoid caffeine, as it can cause dehydration. Replace salts lost from sweating by drinking beverages with electrolytes; and
- **Limiting sun exposure**—apply sunscreen if you are going to be in the sun. Wear a wide-brimmed hat to protect your face against direct sunlight.

Federal Government Announces \$71 Million Investment to Advance American Solar Manufacturing and Development as Part of Investing in America Agenda

Federal Goverment Announces More Than \$300 Million in Brownfield Grants Through Investing in America Agenda to Rehabilitate and Revitalize Communities

On May 20, 2024, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced over \$300 million in grant awards to assist States, Tribal Nations, local governments, and non-profit organizations with assessing and cleaning up contaminated brownfield sites throughout the nation. The funding will help clean up and convert brownfields (once-polluted, vacant, and abandoned properties) into "community assets," helping to generate jobs and "spur economic revitalization in overburdened communities." Federal Government Announces Recipients of nearly \$900 Million for Clean School Buses Under President's Investing in America Agenda

On May 29, 2024, the U.S. EPA announced selections for the Clean School Bus Program rebate competition, which provides funds for school districts to replace older, diesel fueled school buses with clean ones—92% of which will be electric. Florida school districts were among those selected, including the Miami-Dade County school district, who will be receiving \$19.75 million to upgrade their fleet. New Law Bans Intentional Balloon Releases in Florida

On June 24, 2024, Governor Ron DeSantis signed a bill banning the the intentional release of balloons outdoors. Those who partake in a balloon release will be fined a civil penalty, with exceptions for children aged six and younger or individuals who release balloons for

scientific or meteorological purposes. The law goes into effect July 1, 2024. For more information, click HERE.


